#### 11:35–12:30 SETTING THE SCENE: UNDERSTANDING THE REAL IMPACT OF CLIMATE CHANGE

This session will feature people living on the frontlines of climate change, including youth, indigenous people and representatives from the most climate vulnerable countries, to provide a picture of the climate realities they face and inspire collective efforts to address the climate crisis. This session will highlight urgent climate priorities facing humanity, setting the scene for the Parliamentary Meeting.

## 13:30–14:55 SESSION 1 - MAKING CLIMATE COMMITMENTS A REALITY: PARLIAMENTS' ROLE IN RAISING MITIGATION AMBITION AND IMPLEMENTING NATIONALLY DETERMINED CONTRIBUTIONS

This session will focus on ensuring that the mitigation commitments made under the Paris Agreement effectively translate into national action. It will pay particular attention to the role of parliaments in the development and implementation of revised Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), which will be submitted in 2025. The session will showcase best practices at the national level in reducing greenhouse gas emissions, including from methane, and how parliaments have played an integral role in these efforts.

The panellists' presentations will be followed by an interactive discussion.

## 14:55–16:15 SESSION 2 - UNPACKING THE GLOBAL CLIMATE FINANCE ARCHITECTURE: MOBILIZING RESOURCES AND STREAMLINING ACCESS TO CLIMATE FINANCE

This session will focus on parliamentary efforts to ensure climate finance is scaled up and made available to countries in need, particularly developing countries. It will discuss key developments in global climate finance, including the Loss and Damage Fund and the New Collective Quantified Goal (NCQG) on climate finance, which will be a major topic at COP29. Parliaments from both developed and developing countries will have the opportunity to discuss how they can support these critical funding arrangements to accelerate the mobilization and distribution of essential financial resources with a view to ensuring countries most in need are provided with sufficient funding.

The panellists' presentations will be followed by an interactive discussion.

### 16:15–17:35 SESSION 3 - ENHANCING RESILIENCE IN THE FACE OF CLIMATE CHANGE: SCALING UP ADAPTATION AND LOCAL EMPOWERMENT

This session will focus on national and global efforts to address the adaptation needs of people already severely impacted by climate change. It will discuss progress made on the Global Goal on Adaptation (GGA) and opportunities for parliaments to support the implementation of national adaptation plans (NAPs), including by ensuring they are backed by appropriate legislation. The session will provide an important platform for showcasing parliamentary efforts to support successful adaptation and empower local communities to drive climate action, which can serve as inspiration for other parliaments.

10:10–11:30 SESSION 4 - ADDRESSING CLIMATE VULNERABILITY: PROMOTING A COMPREHENSIVE AND EQUITABLE APPROACH TO CLIMATE ACTION

Building on the insights gained in Day 1 on the real-life impacts of climate change, this session will provide parliamentarians with an opportunity to delve deeper into how to address the unique vulnerabilities of different countries, such as SIDS, mountainous and landlocked countries. It will discuss some of the important features of these environments, such as nature and biodiversity, that are essential for sustainable development in these contexts and how they can be protected and utilized to address climate change. The session will also encourage dialogue on social vulnerabilities exacerbated by climate change, particularly among youth, and promote an intergenerational dialogue on climate change.

The panellists' presentations will be followed by an interactive discussion.

### 11:30–12:45 SESSION 5 - HARNESSING TECHNOLOGY TO TACKLE CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENSURING FAIR ACCESS

This session will explore the role of technology, including artificial intelligence (AI), in addressing climate change, and showcase some new technologies that can be instrumental in advancing climate action. It will also focus on how parliaments can ensure technologies are used in a safe, responsible and

inclusive manner. Opportunities for parliaments to promote fair and equal access to such technologies, particularly in developing countries, will also be discussed.

## 13:45–15:10 SESSION 6 - EFFORTS TO SAFEGUARD HEALTH AND FOOD SECURITY IN THE FACE OF A CHANGING CLIMATE

This session will discuss the impacts of climate change on people's health with a particular focus on the health consequences created by climate-induced food insecurity. It will explore how parliaments can take a comprehensive and complementary approach to addressing health-climate challenges. It will also discuss strategies for reducing losses in the agricultural and fisheries sector, which are driving food insecurity and malnutrition.

The panellists' presentations will be followed by an interactive discussion.

## 15:10–16:30 SESSION 7 - NAVIGATING HUMAN MOBILITY AND CLIMATE CHANGE: ADDRESSING CLIMATE-INDUCED MIGRATION AND DISPLACEMENT

This session will focus on the growing trend of migration and displacement due to growing climate change impacts. It will discuss opportunities for parliaments to address the underlying causes of migration and displacement and promote strategies to ensure the protection of displaced persons and migrants. It will also explore the linkages between climate and human security, and how parliaments can promote this, including in contexts where countries are at risk of disappearing due to climate change.

The panellists' presentations will be followed by an interactive discussion.
